TOP 10 RISKIEST SCAMS IN CANADA

The riskiest scam type reported by Canadians in 2021 was cryptocurrency scams, thanks to high susceptibility (69.6%) and a median dollar loss of \$1.500 CAD. Advance fee loan scams fell from the riskiest scam in 2020 to the second riskiest in 2021, with a susceptibility of 57.7% and a median dollar loss of \$1,000 CAD. The third riskiest scam type reported in Canada was online purchase scams, again making up almost a third of all scams reported by Canadians. Notably, phishing scams rose from the eighth riskiest scam in 2020 to fifth riskiest in 2021. Counterfeit product scams rose from tenth riskiest in 2020 to sixth riskiest in 2021; this is likely related to the rise of online purchase scams since the COVID-19 pandemic began.

A Three-Dimensional Approach to Measuring Scam Risk

To better understand which scam types pose the highest risk, this report assesses scams based on three factors:

► EXPOSURE

(volume of reports, as a percentage)

► SUSCEPTIBILITY

(percentage of those exposed who lost money)

► MONETARY LOSS

(median dollar amount of losses reported)

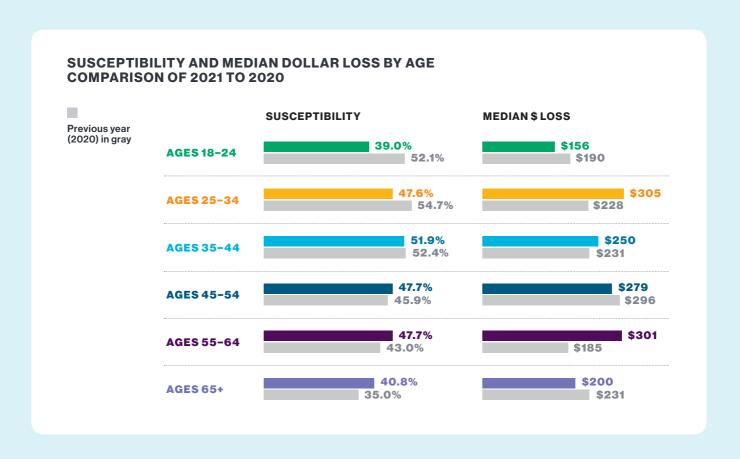

By combining these three factors, we gain a more meaningful picture of scam risk that goes beyond merely the number of reports received. We call this unique formula the BBB Risk Index.

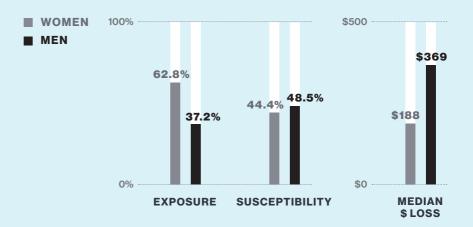
DEMOGRAPHIC HIGHLIGHTS FOR SCAMS IN CANADA

Canadians ages 25–34 reported the highest median dollar losses in 2021 at \$305 CAD, up from \$228 In 2020; the median dollar loss for ages 55–64 also increased from \$185 in 2020 to \$301 in 2021. In 2021, Canadians ages 18–24 lost money less often in 2021 (39.0%) than they did in 2020 (52.1%). Canadians ages 65+ lost money more often in 2021 (40.8%) than in 2020 (35.0%).



Consistent with previous years and with American consumers, more women reported scams and men reported higher median losses than women. Notably, Canadian men again reported both higher susceptibility (48.5%) than women (44.4%) and a significantly higher median dollar loss (\$369) than women (\$188).

10 General Tips for AVOIDING A SCAM

Never send



money to someone you have never met face-to-face.

Don't click on links or open attachments in unsolicited email or text messages.

Don't believe everything you see or read.

> Scammers are great at mimicking official seals, fonts, and other details. Just because a website or email looks official does not mean it is. Even Caller ID can be faked.

Take precautions when making online purchases.

> Don't shop on price alone. Scammers offer hard-to-find products at great prices.

Don't buy online unless the transaction is secure. Make sure the website has "https" in the URL (the extra s is for "secure") and a small lock icon on the address bar. Even then, the site could be shady. Research the company first at BBB.org.

Avoid making quick purchases while browsing social media. Scammers advertise websites that offer great deals, but either don't deliver the product at all or deliver counterfeit products.

Do more research on those products you found via online search.

Be extremely cautious when dealing with anyone you've met online.



Don't be pressured to act immediately.





Whenever possible, work with businesses that have proper identification, licensing, and insurance.

Never share personally identifiable information with someone who has contacted you unsolicited.

Use secure, traceable transactions when making payments for goods, services, taxes, and debts.

Be cautious about what you share on social media.
