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


## Offender Management Breaking the cycle



# LIMITATIONS OF POLICE REPORTED CRIME DATA

Based on the 2014 GSS on Victimization, just under one-third (31%) of victimization incidents were reported to the police.


Most incidents (67%) go unreported (Perreault, 2015).

The proportion of victimization incidents reported to police in 2014 (31%) was unchanged from 2009, but decreased since 2004 (34%) and 1999 (37%).

In general, the more serious an incident, the greater the likelihood it will be reported to police.

Sexual assault is the notable exception to this trend, being the least likely crime to be reported to police in 2014.

**Crime Reduction Strategy**

The Alberta RCMP's Crime Reduction Strategy measures five key property crime indicators which count the number of reported incidents of Break and Enters, Theft of Motor Vehicles, Theft over and under \$3,000, and Possession of Stolen Property in Alberta RCMP jurisdictions. Although these crime indicators do not represent every type of property crime (fraud, arson and mischief), they represent the overall state and trend of property crime in Alberta RCMP jurisdictions.

Alberta RCMP has created Crime Reduction Units in all four districts. Teams are comprised of regular members, analysts and clerks. They target repeat offenders and address repeat crime trends to reduce impact of crime in communities across Alberta.

**Intelligence Program**

Specialized Intelligence Coordinators that conduct intelligence gathering of their own and liaise with enforcement partners to develop a picture of the crime landscape.

Intelligence analysts embedded within our Crime Reduction Units that analyze massive amounts of data and provide information that leads to arrests.







# Criminal Justice and Public Health Framework





## Top 100 offenders in context

- The top 25 targets from each District (100 total) represent\*:
  - 4,065 Calls for Service
  - 14,942 hours of work (**12.45 FTEs**)
  - A CSI score of 333,369

\*Based only on the files in PROS

- Removing the files for these 100 people would reduce the overall RCMP K Division CSI by approximately 2.5%.
- For context – CSI Totals for 2017 (prior to population adjustment):
  - Airdrie: 321,169
  - Wetaskiwin: 316,781
  - Leduc: 392,725



# Repeat victims of crime

- 10% of victims represent 38% of the crime impact
- From our initial review some of the same factors that affect offenders affect victims of crime:
  - Housing insecurity
  - Income insecurity
  - Substance abuse
  - Mental Health impacts
- \*Based only on the files in PROS
- **Anonymized victim History**
- **Law enforcement/Justice involvement**
  - Extensive police involvement as both a SOC and Victim. Number 2 is frequently engaging with local RCMP as both a subject of complaint and a victim. She was involved in police occurrence 11 times during the month of December 2020.
  - Over 28 police occurrences involving assault/assault with a weapon and family violence
  - Has been a victim on 6 reported sexual assaults. 3 occurred in 2020.
  - Multiple Mental Health Calls involving the victim.
  - No Domestic violence reported

- Virtual Opioid Dependency Program (VODP) partnering with Police is a real time solution


